## 2 and 3. Approval of the minutes of AGM 2023 and matters arising

The minutes were approved.

Matters arising: (1) the review of entry systems is with Mike Gardner for costs benefit analysis; (2) confirmed that last year's (2023) accounts were independently examined and audited by Amanda Price and that she will do the same for 2024. Our thanks to Amanda for her work.

## 6. Strategy update

The club's 3 year strategy was launched at the Open Meeting in February 2024. A full review will be presented after 12 months. Nicky Hart updated the meeting on some key areas of progress so far: (1) development (discussed in more detail by John Duckworth, item 7) - Chris Millard's work as CDO has raised the club's profile in Derby through the MapRun programme and helped to bring in new members; MapActive sessions have helped newcomers to develop key O skills; a new development group is actively working on the strategic oversight and programming side, led by JD; we have carried out a review of the event teams and volunteers, a further phase to come will look at how we can make more

efficient use of our volunteers and / or design our events so we need fewer people to run them. (2) Welcoming new members – SB’s “buddy lite” scheme of matching new members with a club buddy (see membership report attached) is working well – noted that it is important for us all to look out for our new members and be supportive and welcoming; Lester and Judith Evans are working up proposals for how we can make our events more open, friendly and welcoming for newcomers. (3) Sociableness: we are holding 2 open meetings per year as well as the AGM and increasing the club presence at events with club tents, banners and cake; the DVO WhatsApp group has become a popular way of sharing news, info, successes, disasters, maps, lifts etc. (4) Inclusivity: we have taken some positive steps to encourage and welcome to our events people with autism – offering quiet starts, quiet parking and encouraging people to contact the organiser if they have special needs we can help with – Doug Dickinson has been instrumental in us driving forward these changes which are helping to signal that we are open to all; there is more to come but our profile has risen, other clubs are watching and following, and we have influenced BOF. (5) Collaborating and influencing: we are working closely in our strategic priority areas with other EM clubs, especially NOC, and with BOF; we’ve been involved in discussions on some areas of BOF policy relevant to our work with newcomers.

## 7. Development report

John Duckworth reported on the club development overseen by the new group he leads, first of all noting that the aim of the work is to increase participation. Last winter DVO put on 19 MapRuns; there were 650 finishes from 236 runners of which 192 were non members; this autumn/winter we’ve had 180 runners, 125 non-members – showing that we are successfully tapping into a new cohort. The discussion with BOF over the levy payable (or not) on our free MapRuns (see Chair’s report) was resolved in our favour. John reported on two large grants awarded to the club totalling £8000, from the Orienteering Foundation and Sport England. This is not free money, we are contractually obliged to deliver specific outputs. The Sport England grant is part of the lottery-funded Movement Fund - £5000 specifically to deliver evening orienteering in Derby, the award only to be spent on that; we have programmed 36 MapRun events over 2 years at the end of which we must report back. Helen noted that the SE money will need to be separated out in the accounts and the expenditure on SE-related items specifically kept apart from general expenditure. Chris Millard noted that the SE badging has already helped to attract extra attention to our MapRuns, through ParkRun displaying our materials. The other grant for £3000, delivered in 2 parts over 2 years is from OF and also has strings attached. It is aimed at taking the MapRun cohort and other newcomers through to forest orienteering and will cover delivery of: 2 MapActive courses teaching essential skills; 10 Level D events (the first having been held at Alvaston, using MapRun and physical controls combined); and a Navigation Festival for newcomers in collaboration with the National Trust, most likely at Hardwick with NOC. The OF is concerned that too much expertise rests in Chris as CDO and it is important the load is shared. Chris has already run a Teams meeting on planning MapRuns for other club members to get involved. We are to report back to OF before getting the second half of the award and at the end. These grants show confidence in our club from OF and SE and the

activities they fund (and accounting back to the funders) will be the development group's focus going forward.

Ranald asked about the earlier club initiative to work with Muslim women in Derby, as we have a major focus in the city. John said that Derby is a very mixed city, we are pushing into new areas and new cohorts of people and we have emphasised with SE that we are open to and keen to encourage people from all ethnic groups, not minding that we are starting from such a low base.

Viv asked about the strategic aim to maintain or find new quality areas for forest orienteering. Jane said that it remains a strategic priority but in the first year of the new strategy we are focussing on the people and membership side of things.

## 8. Club Captain's report

Christine Middleton reported on the CSC 2024 at Brereton Spurs where 49 club members ran and we were placed a close 3<sup>rd</sup> behind OD and NGOC; JK Relays (our mini relay team jointly with NOC finished 3<sup>rd</sup>); BC Relays (good performances from several teams including 3<sup>rd</sup> place in Women's Premier), British Sprint Relay Championships (3<sup>rd</sup> place in Super Veterans). Throughout the summer DVO members have been well represented at various multi-day events including O-Ringen and the World Masters Orienteering Championship in Finland.

Looking ahead we have an excellent entry of over 60 for the upcoming club championship including 5 juniors and new members taking part.

Next year's CSC will on Sunday 23<sup>rd</sup> February at Clumber Park, organised by NOC. As it is on our doorstep Christine is hoping for a record entry. The final will be in Redcar on 14<sup>th</sup> September, CLOK organising.

## 9. Approval of DVO committee restructure and election of new committee member

Nicky's paper on the committee restructure is appended below.

Sally Calland was nominated for election as a committee member by Ranald Macdonald, seconded by Anne Kayley-Burgess and duly appointed.

The meeting approved the committee restructure proposal and the new slate of committee members as set out in the paper.

## Chair's Report

What a whirlwind year it has been. Let's start with JK, for me the absolute highlight of our calendar. Not only was it hugely rewarding for the officials and all the helpers, a few of us have heard it spoken of as 'the best day of the JK' by people from other clubs. An enormous thank you to John, Sal, Viv, Rachel for a quality event which also turned out to be fun too. We all know how stressful it can be putting on an event like this but DVO works so well under pressure because everyone can be trusted to get on with their job. And at the JK, the people without jobs, or who had finished their allocated job, mucked in to get everything done to the DVO standard.

I'd like to make a special mention of two people. I'm sure we all would think that being in charge of the JK trophies is a bit of a doddle. It soon became very clear at the JK Sprints that it wasn't. But Judith is a consummate pro and all three prize giving days passed off without incident, and with some hugely innovative and eco-friendly prizes. The other person is Richard. There are a couple of mappers in this country whose names are synonymous with quality, and Richard is one of these. I know people who will come to an event just because Richard has drawn the map. Quality doesn't just mean being geographically accurate but ensuring that what the competitor sees on the map is reflected on the ground. This is a high level of skill and one that is often not appreciated.

The magic of the JK continued after the Monday. Rachel had lost her dibber in the dark putting out controls and found it when we were litter picking on Stanton Moor the following week. And DVO will receive a share of the JK profits. So please, if you played a small part in this wonderful competition, give yourselves a pat on the back.

We had discussed what to do with this funding at the last committee meeting and decided it should be ploughed back into development, although there has been a request for a new big club tent to replace the blue and yellow beast now that no one knows how to erect it and no one wants to carry it!

This year I feel we have really built on the work that Stuart started and which Sal continued and it is beginning to reap rewards. Nicky will talk about the strategy, John will talk about development, including the funding we have obtained, and Simon membership and it is interesting that we are now seen as something like subject matter experts on new ways to attract members.

Part of my job, I feel, is to strengthen relationships with other clubs and also with BOF. Spring was a time of heated debate with a number of parties about the BOF levies on MapRun events. Interestingly although the heated debates kicked off the discussions, it was a smaller and calmer team that negotiated the result we wanted which is that provided we don't have a MapRun league or publish results, we don't pay the £2.50 per adult levy and allows us to continue to run our MapRun training events for free. A further result of the conversations was a recognition from BOF that they have dropped the newcomer ball slightly. This has now been picked up again.

I'd like to say a few thank yous, because without the work that a huge proportion of our club do, there would be no club. Over half the club turned out to help at the JK so thank you members, for coming and doing and helping and running and having ideas and helping to implement them. Thank you committee and fixtures committee for doing a great job, being open to new ideas and for getting on with them. Thank you to my fabulous vice chair, Nicky

whose enthusiasm knows no bounds, who supports and encourages me and also who knows how to indicate in a kindly way when something maybe isn't such a good idea. And a few other people, all of whom have been instrumental in making DVO the cohesive and capable club it is today, dedicating time, effort, thought and commitment to the club. These people have, for different reasons, decided to take a step back and we are now having to manage more or less without their tremendous expertise. Mike and Liz obviously couldn't continue from Scotland although Mike is still our mapping quality controller, checking we haven't missed anything off the map or chosen the wrong sized paper before the H&L print run. Ranald and Viv both requested that they relinquish their roles by this AGM and we have achieved this (mostly!). A formal thanks to all four and also to the new people who have stepped up since the last AGM and whose presence is, and will be, felt in the coming years. There are always jobs to be done and a healthy club is one that can let people, who have done their bit and more, to move on and to bring in new people with fresh ideas. And finally, someone who hasn't stepped back after being Chair for three years, Sal. I'm sure you all appreciate that the queen of media, social and otherwise, does a great job of advertising our events in ways that other clubs just can't manage. And her innovation skills are legend. I'd love to live in Sal's mind when she is considering a Dracula themed level D in Derby but I'm not sure I could keep up!

Current **170** (165 at AGM 2023)

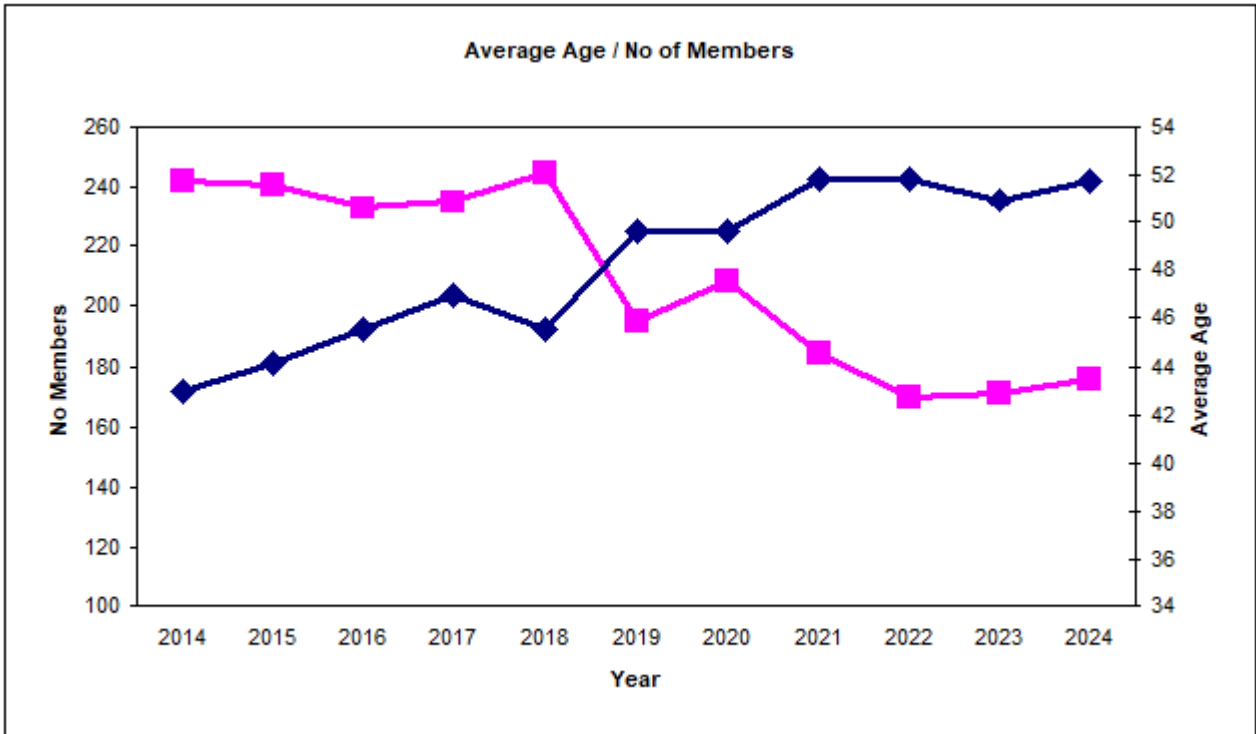
In addition, **we have 6 'Life members'** (plus 2 who are still paid up members (Liz and Mike) and included in the 170)

We have, as you know, put in place a full revision of the teams of volunteers which is now fully complete.

Over the full year we have been sending introductory emails to all new members welcoming them to the club and then again after 6 months hoping that they are enjoying their membership as well as suggesting that they might like to volunteer themselves for a ‘team’.

**In addition to this we have recently introduced an informal ‘buddy lite’ arrangement** whereby an existing member of the club is asked to be a point of contact with the new members – usually someone of similar age category and living nearby. We saw this as key to working at involving new members and ensuring their retention as club members.

We continue, as soon as we hear that a member has achieved a Racing or Navigation Challenge award, to send them a congratulatory email also advising on the procedure for downloading their certificate.

At this point I would like to pay tribute to the work and help I have received from John Hawkins in bringing the Microsoft Access software up to date and removing any gremlins that have crept in. Please be reassured that no gremlins were harmed in this process.

A final note is that my 3 year term as Membership Secretary comes to an end at the next AGM and so we shall be seeking a keen volunteer during the coming year. If you fancy contributing to the club in this way please do get in touch and I can happily talk through the work involved.

### TREASURER'S ANNUAL REPORT 2023/24

The DVO's financial year runs from 1 September to 31 August. This current Annual Report provides an analysis of the Club's finances for the financial year 2023/24.

#### Overview

At year end DVO's total financial assets stood at £23,221.

The Current Account balance has increased by £259 this year to £11,896.

The Business Bank Instant (Savings) Account, stands at £11,175, an increase of £140.

In addition, there is a further £150 in the Registration Float.

#### Business Bank Instant (Savings) Account

There were no withdrawals from or deposits to the Club's Business Bank Instant (Savings) Account. The year-end balance stood at £11,175 which included accrued interest of £140.

## Current Account

The Current Account balance results from receipts of £26,896 against an expenditure of £26,638 since the start of the financial year, leading to an increased balance within period of £259. Adding this to the opening balance of £11,637 gives a closing balance of £11,896.

This includes the receipt of £5,050 from the Lottery Grant which pertains to costs that will be incurred in the next financial year. As such the position related just to the financial year 23/24 is a loss of £4,791 during the year. Further details on this are provided later in the report.

### Committee restructure proposal

One of the commitments in our three year strategy was to review the club's governance, look at areas where updating may be needed and report back to the club.

We aim to update and streamline the way the club is run, to become more sustainable and efficient - reducing the load on volunteers, cutting down unnecessary travel, and ensuring meetings are structured in the best way to promote open discussion and encourage new ideas and different views.

The present committee, which is responsible for running the club, we feel is too large for efficiency, and its constitution out of line with other comparable clubs. It was set up when we had many more members than now and posts have been added to a total of about 23 (some unfilled), with up to 15 or 16 people attending.

This proposal, approved by the DVO committee, is to rationalise and reduce its size, first by reducing the number to the constitutional minimum of 11, to be approved at the AGM on 9<sup>th</sup> October 2024. Over the next year we will review the club's constitution and work towards presenting amendments to allow for a smaller committee to be approved at the 2025 AGM to manage the club for the future.

We also propose to move away from titles necessarily going with committee membership and towards a more flexible approach with areas of responsibility or members being without portfolio. In addition we'll keep a clear list of those holding key roles and responsibilities the club needs to have fulfilled, but not necessarily involving committee membership.

The slate we propose to the AGM for approval is as follows, complying with the present DVO constitution:

Seven elected officers (elected annually at the AGM):

- Chair – Jane Kayley-Burgess
- Vice-Chair – Nicky Hart
- Secretary – Simon Brister
- Treasurer – Helen Chiswell
- Captain – Christine Middleton
- Fixtures Chair – Kim Buxton
- Elected Committee Member – Vacant
